Editorial

I previously mentioned my concerns about the junction on the Maynooth-Leixlip Road at Blacklion, where traffic joins the R148 from the R157. After witnessing another two near misses of accidents since last month, I felt that I should raise my concerns again. It is well known that traffic in the centre of Maynooth is an issue, so with options to avoid the main street to access places such as Maynooth

University, the volumes of traffic now using this junction has significantly increased. Although this junction will be changed when the Maynooth Eastern Relief Road crosses the Royal Canal and the rail line, that maybe too late for someone. A roundabout or traffic lights is needed there as a matter of urgency. Meanwhile, my advice is to avoid it if possible as I will be.



Science Week is a week-long event in Ireland each November, celebrating science in our everyday lives. Science Week includes a wide variety of events involving industry, colleges, schools, libraries, teachers, researchers and students throughout Ireland. Science Week has a number of regional festivals offering a range

of opportunities for the public to engage with STEM in across Ireland. As usual Maynooth University is marking Science Week 2024, they have an exciting line-up of events scheduled throughout the week, with a special Science Night on November 15th.

With the Maynooth Development Plan 2025-2031 now finalised, residents in the Moyglare area were pleased that the majority of our Councillors voting on the proposals took on board their concerns on permeability. While the development plan has many good proposals, the proposals on permeability were not well received. The entire Moyglare area is quite compact, where walking between estates takes less than the time needed to meet the ten minute town ambitions for Maynooth. Also, the Moyglare Road is well served with excellent safe cycling facilities that stretches from Maynooth Education Campus to the Main Street and will link with the plans to extend the cycling route across Maynooth to support active travel.

A large number of individual submissions to Kildare County Council on permeability showed that the proposals were not required in the area. In particular, Moyglare Village is already impacted by casual daily parking which has made the estate dangerous for residents. It has become difficult for residents to ensure parking will be available for family visitors, carers or indeed deliveries and services, not to even mention the safety of

children either playing on the green areas or walking to school. Permeability with Maynooth University would have inevitability increased casual parking in this estate and the through road to Moyglare Abbey would have resulted in a traffic rat run because of traffic volumes at peak times on the Moyglare Road.

Lights needed the Celbridge Road

At the recent Council meeting, Cllr. Feeney called for the installation of public lights at the top of Barrogstown Lane on the Celbridge Road. In speaking to the motion, Cllr. Feeney stated that this section of the Celbridge Road is near an extremely bad bend and with Barrogstown Lane/Obelisk lane feeding on to it. Many residents who use the nearby bus stop have been in touch with Cllr. Feeney calling for public lighting to be installed in the vicinity of the bus stop. At the moment, residents have to cross at a very bad bend; there is no footpath and no light. Cllr. Feeney welcomed the fact that the Council agreed for the need for lighting there and for the public lighting section to get a quotation from the Public Lighting Maintenance Contractor. She welcomes the response from the Council because it is a priority area in need of lighting for safer travel.

Automated External Defibrillators (AED) in housing estates

Cllr. Feeney was recently out visiting one particular large estate in the town when there was an incident at a house that required the emergency services being called to attend the scene. While neighbours waited for the emergency services to arrive, it prompted the question about the installation of AEDs in housing estates. Cllr. Feeney acknowledges the great work done by First Responders and the many lives they help save. While the Council has no direct role to play in the provision of or installation of AEDs in public places Cllr. Feeney believes that new housing developments should include AEDs because they can potentially save lives. Cllr Feeney is pursuing the matter with the relevant stakeholders including the HSE and ESB networks.

Cul-de-sac road at Clonagh

Cllr. Feeney visited the road in Clonagh and met the residents who live there. The residents are worried about the quality and safety of the road. In speaking to the motion, Cllr. Feeney said that small rural roads change over time due to demographics, increased volume of cars and traffic. On the particular road in question, there are more residents now and there is a local business there too, all of which have an impact on the road quality. Cllr. Feeney welcomed the fact that the area engineer agreed to meet on site and assess what measures can be taken to improve road safety.

Draft Local Area Plan for Maynooth

At the October 21st meeting to consider the draft Local Area Plan for Maynooth, Cllr. Feeney is happy that her following motions were approved:

- •Sport pitches at the Maynooth Educate Together
- •Redevelop the existing Maynooth Health Centre to a State of the Art Primary Care Centre
- Primary school provision
- •Expansion of current community unit for the elderly
- •The provision of a swimming pool for Maynooth.
- •Community centre/hub at vacated fire brigade/council site at harbour area
- •An arts and culture centre
- Active travel trials
- •Improve and review the current drop-off facility at Maynooth Education

great for students travelling to TU Dublin Tallaght Campus or Maynooth University but also going to Tallaght University Hospital. Cllr. Feeney said that this connectivity is needed between our growing towns. The service was delayed due to works to widen the Hazelhatch Bridge and the route has temporarily operated by Go Ahead Ireland as the W61 and W62 since summer 2023. Cllr. Feeney will continue to push for better public transport, as it is much needed.

Nominated to Local Community Safety Partnership

Cllr. Feeney is honoured to be nominated, by her fellow councillors, to serve on County Kildare's Local Community Safety Partnership representing the Maynooth Local Electoral Area. Local Community Safety Partnerships are being established in each Local Authority area in line with the Policing, Security and Community Safety Act 2024. These new Partnerships will build on and replace the existing Joint Policing Committees (JPCs) and will provide a forum for State agencies and local community representatives to work together at local level to act on community concerns. This will facilitate a more holistic forum for discussion, decisions and action on community priorities

- It will give the community a stronger voice in identifying and tackling the issues that individuals, families, young people, business owners and all members of the community face.
- Representatives of the community will make up 51% of the members of the Local Community Safety Partnership, meaning community voices will be the majority.
- The Local Community Safety Partnership will work with the community to identify local priorities and use these to develop a local community safety plan that will be delivered in a collaborative fashion by all stakeholders.

Meeting with National Transport Authority

At a recent meeting in the Council with the NTA, Cllr. Feeney raised the following issues:

- The need for a cycle/footpath between Maynooth and Celbridge to create safer and more sustainable mobility links across North Kildare.
- That the 139 bus service be added to Real Time Passenger Information tracking system, so that users who are at a stop and are expecting a bus can check to see where it is in real time.
- That the remaining 139 bus stops be put in place.
- To increase the 139 bus service at peak times.
- With regard to DART+ Cllr. Feeney asked for information about the railway order to be issued for the extension of DART+ from Maynooth to Kilcock.
- Cllr. Feeney also asked about the status of the proposed depot that was not approved by Bord Pleanála in its recent decision.

MU Celebrates Space Week

Maynooth University recently celebrated Space Week 2024 with an exciting event that brought the wonders of the universe to life. The free public talk titled "From New Worlds to the Infinite Universe" featured spectacular images and insightful presentations on the latest advancements in space exploration.



Dr Andrew Hogan (Senior Lecturer and Principle Investigator with the Obesity Immunology Research Group at Maynooth University)

A highlight of the evening was a talk by NASA astronaut Steven Swanson, who shared his experiences from over 195 days in space, including five spacewalks, and provided his perspective on the future of space missions.

Younger members of the audience had the unique opportunity to meet Swanson, and to hear from renowned Maynooth University experts in astrophysics, including Dr Colm Bracken, who explored the search for alien life and planets, and Prof Peter Coles, who presented early findings from the European Space Agency's Euclid mission. Hosted by the Department of Physics, the event also featured PhD scholar Aoibhinn Gallagher who discussed mysterious dark matter which dominates the gravity of our Universe and is something we know little about, and PhD scholar Matthew Birney on a range of topics from the discovery of exoplanets and the mechanics of planet formation.

Maynooth University Science Week hosts expert panel on **Ozempic - fact and fiction**

Maynooth University will host a panel discussion on one of the most talked-about drugs, Ozempic, on Thursday, November 14th 2024 from 7pm to 9pm at the Phoenix Restaurant, North Campus. The discussion which is open to the public is titled, 'Ozempic – unravelling fact from fiction', and forms part of Science Week 2024 at Maynooth University. The event will explore the science behind the drug that has prompted questions, misunderstandings and myths.

Two leading experts in obesity research will lead the discussion: Dr Andrew Hogan, Senior Lecturer at the Department of Biology at MU and Principal Investigator with the Obesity Immunology Research Group, and Prof Donal O'Shea, Consultant Endocrinologist with the Obesity Immunology Research Group at St Vincent's University Hospital. Together, they will explore the science behind Ozempic, including how it works and its impact on health.

Using the latest research, they will discuss how these medications have changed the way obesity is treated. They will also address questions such as:

Does Ozempic cause muscle loss?

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

Maynooth Senior Citizens Committee


We are delighted to announce some news in this month's Newsletter. We have resumed our Tuesday Club the first time since Covid. We are

Maynooth Cycling Campaign -Public Meeting 14th November

Maynooth Cycling Campaign will be holding a **PUBLIC MEETING** on Thursday 14th November at 8:00pm in the ICA Hall. The Agenda will include Cycling without Age, the latest on the Maynooth Local Area Plan, and Campaign priorities for 2025. EVERYONE WELCOME!!!

Representative on KCC Transport Strategic Policy Committee

The Public Participation Network (PPN) has invited volunteers to represent the PPN on various Strategic Policy Committees of Kildare County Council. After the council elections in 2019, our Chair was elected to the Transport SPC but was forced to resign as the Council introduced a requirement to prevent a member of the Transport SPC from also sitting on the Sustainability Transport Forum which had replaced/ incorporated the Kildare Cycle Forum. As the Maynooth Cycling representative was the only person who was forced to resign, we are seeking removal of this requirement. Maynooth Cycling Campaign will be seeking election to the new Transport SPC and will be looking for the support of PPN groups.

Accidents KSIs

The Road Safety Authority has recently been criticised by politicians and the general public about the rise in road fatalities over the past two years. This comes after a long period of time when the number of road fatalities annually were decreasing. Elsewhere, other authorities do not assess the safety of roads on the basis of the number of fatalities but of a combination of road fatalities and the seriously injured. A recent report by Ciarán Ferrie on IrishCycle.com website looked at the record of fatalities and seriously injured (KSI).



Local Area Plan - Deletion of Proposed Permeability Measures

Councillors have given their response to the September Report by the KCC Chief Executive on the LAP submissions. The main outcome was that a representative from each of the four political parties proposed to delete several of the permeability proposals.

Maynooth Cycling Campaign is disappointed that an overwhelming majority of councillors supported the deletion of more than 1/3 of the over 140 measures proposed to encourage walking and cycling. The action of councillors is hard to reconcile with their vote to recognise a climate (and biodiversity) emergency in June 2019 with the agreement of all members and with fifty one people currently missing in Spain after severe flooding.

Irish Rail and Access for All

Anyone travelling regularly by train would notice that Irish Rail regularly gives updates on the location of "Out of Order" lifts at stations. In mid-October, four stations were listed - Bayside, Tara, Grand Canal and Park West. Out of order lifts are not a huge problem for able bodied people but can be a critical issue for some people with disabilities. We will be keeping an eye on what progress Irish Rail makes in repairing them

The report revealed that although the number of deaths fell after 2013, the number of serious injuries have risen significantly.

Poppy Day By Cheryl Devaney

Armistice Day, later known as Remembrance Day, is commemorated every year on November 11th to mark the armistice, an agreed suspension of fighting by opposing sides. This was signed between the Allies of World War I and Germany at Compiègne, northern France. It specified that hostilities on the Western Front would cease at 11 a.m. on the eleventh month of 1918.

Poppies were a frequent sight on what became known as the Western Front, when Germany invaded Luxembourg, Belgium and later France. The common poppy seed can remain dormant in soil for as long as a hundred years but needs light to grow, so only germinates in disturbed soil. These beautiful and resilient flowers flourished therefore in the soil churned up by the fighting and shelling. Many soldiers would send pressed poppies home in letters. In 1915, Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae, a Canadian military surgeon, wrote a poem while serving in Ypres, Belgium. It begins:

In Flanders Fields, the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row...

In January 1918, McCrae died of pneumonia in a British army hospital in Wimereux, France. His poem has endured as a symbol of the sacrifice made by those who fought during World War I and inspired an American academic, Moina Michael, to adopt the poppy as an official emblem of remembrance across America and Canada.

Francis Ledwidge from Slane, County Meath was another poet who was killed in action in 1917. Many of his poems were lost whilst fighting in Serbia and it is likely that some of these dealt with the Western Front, as shown in the final lines from 'The Dead Kings': 'A bomb burst near me where I lay. I woke, 'twas day in Picardy'.

Dublin barrister, Thomas Kettle, while fighting on The Western Front, wrote a poem entitled 'To My Daughter Betty' that includes the lines:

'So here, while the mad guns curse overhead And tired men sigh with mud for couch and floor

He was killed in 1916 at the age of thirty-six during the Battle of the Somme.

Artificial poppies were first sold in Britain in 1921 to raise money for the Earl Haig Fund, which supported ex-servicemen and the families of those who had died in the conflict. Anna Guérin, who was born in 1878 in Vallon, Ardèche, France, supplied the million ordered flowers. Initially, her poppies had benefited widows and orphans of the war, which had devastated regions of France. With petals of silk, wire for the stem and bitumen for the centre and assembled by French war widows, Anna was known as 'The Poppy Lady from France'.

The artificial poppies became extremely popular and, when demand exceeded supply, in 1922 the British Legion founded a factory in Richmond-Upon-Thames, London. It was staffed by disabled servicemen to produce their own poppies and still continues today, any money earned during the Poppy Appeal helping army veterans. Poppy wreaths are also made in this factory and there is another poppy factory in Edinburgh but those poppies have no green leaves.

Over the years, different poppy versions have been produced. In the 1930s, poppies were made from an under layer of lawn cloth with an upper layer of silk and a green fabric leaf. Materials being in short supply during the Second World War, they were now made entirely from card. Wire stems returned in the 1950s, the poppy petals being made from red felt. In 1967, plastic stems replaced wire ones with a one-piece petal. 1987 saw the poppy regain its green leaf as the public preferred this feature and, in 2023, the British Legion produced a plastic-free poppy made entirely from recyclable paper. Other charities sell poppies in different colours: white poppies symbolizing peace without violence and purple ones honouring animals killed in conflict.

In 2014, the Tower of London marked the centenary of the outbreak of World War I with an art installation by Paul Cummins and Tom Piper entitled, 'Blood Swept Lands and Seas of Red'. For this display 888,246 ceramic poppies, each representing a British World War I military fatality, flowed out of the Tower itself, filling the entire moat.

While the red poppy represents peace, eternal sleep, resurrection and the often heroic activities of the armed forces, many feel it has become too political, using the powerful feelings it creates to justify war. Many Irish people do not wear the poppy as it has become a divisive symbol, a signifier of support for the presence of the British army in Northern Ireland.

Red Deer and Rhododendrons

Our neighbour, Mrs. Beirne, told us children about the lovely 'rosiedandrums' growing in a corner of the bog. We didn't rest until we found a clump of dark green bushes topped by massive purple blooms that, with blazing, show-off brightness, outdid every flower we'd ever known. Fionn and his warriors with wolfhounds chasing enchanted hinds on foot and learned a poem in which our last red deer are going down to cross the Shannon.

We also heard of park-raised deer the gentry used to hunt on horseback but never saw these antlered monarchs. Later in school we read about Since then rhododendrons have spread, killing off surrounding plant life; red deer, rescued from near extinction, eat the bark of broadleaf saplings, so that in Killarney's National Park both are seen as needing cutback. Perhaps it's true that beauty always depends on rarity for impact?

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My Chequered Life Chapter 10

So I was back to the life I knew, well, sort of knew. There had been changes in my absence! Now there were three major categories of prisoners and I was put in the basic one. I had a minimum amount of money to spend in the tuck shop. I had to wear prison clothes, was allowed one letter a week, could make three phone calls a week, at my own expense and could have one visit per month. Bristol was a category B prison and I met several fellows there that I had met in various other prisons. Most of these had been either in open prisons or cat. C prisons but had offended in some way, drugs or stealing and so forth and had got their six-month punishment back to cat. B.

There was a big stress on course work, anger management, social skills and attitude changing approaches. There were changes also in review procedures which were much more transparent than formerly. Lifers, with a solicitor of their choice, were reviewed by a parole board consisting of a trial judge, a member of the prison authorities and a lay person who would have been some notable in secular society. Here there were strict criteria applied. A prisoner on basic in a cat. B prison could not be recommended for transfer to a category C prison. After a few months I was upgraded from basic to standard and applied to go to The Verne, which I had heard was a decent enough spot.

So in April 2001 I got my wish and arrived in The Verne. The Verne was much like Lay Hill with rooms instead of cells and no bars on the windows. The main difference was that it was situated on an island about a half mile off the Dorset coast, so escape was almost impossible. I settled in quickly and had access to much of my parole reports over the years so I decided I would make a serious effort to follow the courses in anger management, enhanced thinking, alcohol awareness etc. With those courses behind me I thought I'd have a good chance of being released when my next parole review was due.

Again I met several fellows I knew from other prisons, among them was Malcolm. He was working in the wood store and I got him to put in a good word for me to get a job there. I was a bit suspicious of Malcolm but wasn't slow in using him to get what I wanted. My plan worked and he and I brought wood from the wood store to the workshop and brought back the finished items and got them ready for transport to wherever they were bound. At one time there were picture frames of various sizes on the move and I thought that maybe I will hop in amongst them myself some day if things aren't going too well for me!

I mentioned this to a friend of mine, Kevin, and thought no more about it until a few evenings later he threw himself on his knees and implored me to help him to escape as he said he had to get out. I advised strongly against it, mentioning all the negatives, but he persisted and a week or two later I left a side door open so that he could come into the loading bay without being seen by Malcolm or any of the officers. I duly hid him in a stack of picture frames, put some cardboard on top and wrapped the plastic all around it.

The security guys were a bit lackadaisical, they had managed hundreds of these loads, so I gave the word that all was ready for the forklift and one of them did the honours, loaded up the pallets, closed up the side of the lorry and Kevin was on his way. I could see the lorry making its way to the gate, the driver completing whatever formalities there were and then driving down the causeway and Kevin was gone! An hour later I went back to the wing for lunch and shared my story with nobody.

After lunch I was back in my room and this lady prison officer put her head in my door and asked if Kevin was with me. Kevin Jones, said I, no, I haven't seen him all morning. He wasn't there for roll call, she said, do you know where he is. I had no idea, I told her. Very soon other officers came round and went into each room, checked the toilets, bathrooms, associations rooms. They were in Kevin's room but got no clues – I had warned him to leave everything as normal. They searched outside, the flat roofs and walked the perimeter. The local police helped out with their tracker dogs.

Mid afternoon I was called down and walked into the office to be "greeted' by the prison governor, the head of security and maybe four prison officers from my wing. They asked me straight out "where is Kevin Jones?" I said I hardly knew Kevin but they said you spend a lot of time together. Well, yes said, I but we're not married. So there are lots of things I don't know about him. "Did he escape? Did you help him to escape?"

By this time they knew he had escaped and how but couldn't for definite connect me to it. So I was allowed back to my room. A little later the doors on the wings were opened and normal routine was restored. I was watching TV and three prison officers arrived and brought me to the segregation unit. I wasn't too pleased but I went and spent two days there. The governor of another prison was brought in and he asked the same questions and I gave the same answers. I was sacked from my job in the wood store and allowed back among the general population. I found it hard to get another job. I was blacklisted for getting the officers in the wood store into trouble!

Homemade Christmas Pudding

Get motivated in November to make your Christmas pudding to have it mature in time. This really is a figgy pudding as it includes dried figs, as well as all the usual dried fruit. The fig seeds bring a hint of a crunch to the finished pudding, which makes for a first-rate texture. Make and steam it at least a month in advance, so that it has time to mature.

Ingredients

The dry ingredients

- . 275g/10oz soft brown or white breadcrumbs
- 100g/4oz dried apricots, chopped (to about the same size as the raisins)
- 100g/4oz dried figs, chopped (to about the same size as the raisins)
- 225g/8oz currants
- 225g/8oz seedless raisins
- 225g/8oz sultanas
- 75g/3oz high quality candied peel, finely chopped
- 50g/2oz almonds, finely chopped
- 225g/8oz light or dark muscovado sugar
- 225g/8oz shredded suet
- ¹/₂ tsp salt
- 1 tsp ground mixed spice
- . 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp freshly grated nutmeg

The wet ingredients

- 1 orange, zest and juice
- 1 lemon, zest and juice
- . 1 eating apple, cored and grated
- 3 free-range eggs, lightly beaten
- . 150ml/5fl oz stout or similar dark beer
- 150ml/5fl oz milk
- 4 tbsp brandy
- butter, for greasing pudding bowls

Method

Place all the dry ingredients into a large bowl and mix together thoroughly.



Add the wet ingredients and mix together well with your hands (a spoon doesn't do the job half as well). Divide the mixture between two greased $1\frac{1}{2}$ litre/ $2\frac{1}{2}$ pint heatproof pudding bowls, filling almost to the rim, then smooth down the surface.

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Cover each bowl with a large square of greaseproof paper, then cover that with a large square of aluminium foil. Tie the two sheets tightly into place under the rim with string, leaving long ends of excess string to make a handle. Loop one of the excess string lengths over the pudding basin and slide underneath the taut string holding the sheets in place on the other side. Bring up the string and firmly knot with the other piece of excess string, to form a secure handle to lift the pudding in and out of the water.

Leave the puddings somewhere cool overnight before cooking.

To cook, stand both puddings on a trivet in a large, deep, heavybased pan (or each pudding in a separate pan). Pour boiling water into the pan(s), enough to come about halfway up the sides of the bowls.

Cover the pan(s) with a lid or a dome of foil and boil for seven hours. Check the water level regularly, topping it up with more boiling water as necessary to keep the bowls half submerged.

After seven hours, remove the bowls from the pan and leave to cool. Untie and remove the foil and greaseproof sheets and replace with clean, dry sheets of both greaseproof paper and foil.

Store in a cool, dry place (or freeze if you prefer, though they will keep perfectly well for a year or more unfrozen). To reheat at Christmas-time, return to a pan containing a few inches of boiling water, cover and steam for two hours, checking the water levels now and then, until completely heated through.


November is a very busy month for us here in MAFT.

Vaccinations for children and young people

Introduction

Immunisation is a safe and effective way to help your body prevent or fight off certain diseases. You can get immunisation through vaccinations. You can get your child vaccinated under the:

- Childhood Immunisation • Programme
- School Immunisation Programme ٠
- HSE catch-up programme

Check the table below to see what age to get your child vaccinated.

How much do these vaccinations cost?

These vaccinations are free of charge.

Parental consent for vaccines

If you are under 16, you must get your parent or guardian's consent for vaccinations.

Vaccination is not compulsory but is strongly advised by the Department of Health. You should discuss any concerns you may have with your GP (family doctor) before making a decision about your child's immunisation.

Budget 2025: Chickenpox vaccination for children

A free Varicella (chickenpox) vaccination programme for children was announced in Budget 2025. If your child was born on or after 1 October 2024, the vaccine will be part of their childhood vaccinations (see below table).

If your child was born before this date, you can ask your GP for the vaccine, but you will have to pay for it. Read more about the chickenpox vaccine on the HSE website.

Where to get your child vaccinated in Ireland

You are usually offered your child's vaccinations by:

- The hospital where your baby was born
- . The HSE
- Your GP •
- The School Immunisation Programme or

possible after they are due. If your baby is due to have a routine vaccination, you should phone your GP to arrange it. RSV vaccine for newborns 2024-2025

If your baby is born between September 2024 and February 2025, the HSE will offer your baby the vaccine to protect against RSV (respiratory syncytial virus). This is a temporary programme run by the HSE. You can find more information

Vaccines at school

When your child starts school, they can get more vaccinations under the School Immunisation Programme.

During winter, you can usually get the flu vaccine for your child if they are aged from 2 to 17. The flu vaccine for children is given by nasal spray rather than injection.

Vaccine catch-up programmes

If you or your child missed certain vaccines when they were offered, the HSE can sometimes provide these vaccines later in life. Catch-up programmes are often only available to certain age groups and during a specific time period.

MMR catch-up programme

Your child will usually be offered the MMR (measles, mumps and rubella) vaccine when they are 12 months old, followed by a second dose when they are aged 4-5 years old in junior infants. Usually, children can get the MMR until they are aged under 10 years, but currently you can book an appointment for an MMR vaccine at any age if you or your child has missed the MMR vaccine. This is known as the MMR catch-up programme.

Adults born in Ireland before 1978 are likely to have had measles infection and so would not need to get the MMR vaccination.

You will usually be offered vaccines for your baby from your GP (family doctor) until they are 13 months, as part of the Primary Childhood Immunisation Schedule. You can also get your baby vaccinated in hospitals and health clinics.




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In Nuadha Players Community Theatre

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Smart Shopping for Christmas

- Do as much as you can in advance as this will take a lot of pressure off when Christmas does come round. Preparation is key to a stress free Christmas
- Make a budget for food, drink and presents. Stick to that budget
- Write a list of everything you will need including essentials like decorations, napkins, wrapping paper etc.
- Keep track of your shopping and mark off list as you get each item
- Start looking on-line and in stores for early bargains/sales
- Start shopping as early as you can. Buy one item a week if you can
- Visit charity shops/discount stores for stocking fillers
 - Try to get as many items as you can in the one area at the one time. This will save time
 - Food Shop: Buy items in advance such as canned goods, long-life foods, dried food. Check sales for these items. This will make it so much easier than doing a big expensive shop nearer Christmas.

Start looking for sales in soft drinks/ alcohol. Stock up well ahead of the rush.

November is Senior Pet Care Awareness Month - a reminder to give your senior pets a little extra special care and attention. First off, how old is senior? Well, it depends on the breed and size of the pet, but a pet from the age of seven would be considered a senior dog. With our pets living longer, it is a good idea to bring them to the vets more often for wellness exams to keep them healthy, active and happy. Make sure that all their vaccines are up to date.

Signs your pet is aging: cloudy eyes or worsening vision, bad breath, decreased mobility, any bumps under the skin (should be checked by vet straight away), any weight loss or weight gain and having accidents/difficulty in going to the toilet.


Its not only physical signs that can be noticeable in senior pets but it can be mental and behavioural too. These can also be a sign of underlying problems, nice dogs may become grumpy simply because they are in pain which could be caused by arthritis or they may sleep more. They may develop such as cognitive dysfunction syndrome, which is a dementia that is similar to Alzheimer's in us humans. This causes confusion, anxiety, fear and forgetfulness.

Tips: Try to keep their food and water in an easily accessible location and always have fresh water available at all times. Check with your vet to see if their food will have to be adjusted to suit them. Monitor their weight. Raise their bowls if they can't bend down or their movement is restricted. Consider getting ramps, low steps so that they can get to higher places as they may not be able to climb or jump up to the couch or bed. Don't forget to keep an eye on their nails as they may not be able to walk as far and therefore their nails may not be getting worn down as much.

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JACKIE'S CHICKEN, CHICKPEA AND VEGETABLE CURRY

INGREDIENTS

- Chicken pieces Mix vegetables fresh or frozen 1 whole onion
- 1 tin of chickpeas
- 1 tin of light/whole coconut milk
- Garlic paste or fresh garlic
- Tomato paste
- Curry powder
- 1 vegetable stock cube
- Salt & pepper

METHOD

- 1. Fry chicken pieces in a lightly oiled pan and remove from pan
- 2. Add sliced onions and lightly fry al dente and remove from pan
- 3. Add 1 tin of coconut milk to pan
- 4. Add mixed vegetables
- 5. 1 tin of chickpeas
- 6. A generous amount of garlic paste/fresh
- 7. A generous amount of tomato puree
- 8. 1 vegetable stock cube
- 9. 1 to 4 tbsp. of curry powder
- 10. Salt and pepper
- 11. Add chicken and onions back to pan and simmer for 20 minutes or until all the vegetable are al dente and enjoy with or without rice.







Monthly gardening checklist

Fruit and veg



Take hardwood cuttings from healthy fruit bushes, including currants, blueberries and gooseberries.

Use cloches to protect winter peas, beans and salads, but leave the ends open as good ventilation is vital.

Prune autumn-fruiting raspberries to the ground after harvesting.

Plant garlic, shallots and onions in free-draining soil or raised beds, then cover with fleece.

Prune fruit bushes once dormant,



including blackcurrants, redcurrants, white currants and gooseberries.

Support top-heavy **Brussels sprouts** with sturdy canes, and pile earth up around the stems for extra stability.

Cut down **Jerusalem artichokes**, then dig up and store the tubers in a bucket of dry compost.

Put **netting** over **cabbages**, **kale** and other hardy brassicas to protect them from pigeons.

Plant bare-root fruit trees, bushes and canes, as long as the ground isn't too wet.

Check stored crops for signs of rot or deterioration.

Lift and pot up **chicory** roots to force in the dark.

Tidy up **strawberry** beds, cutting back old foliage and congested runners and removing any weeds.
